Children's University in Brief.

Every time your child attends a Children's University accredited club, centre, event or activity, they are awarded a stamp that they collect in their Children's University Passport.

Once they have collected at set amount of stamps they are awarded with certificates.

Your child's school will be providing you with the Passport, all we are asking is you try to attend as many activities as possible.

There are many local activities and events. These can be found on the Children's University website. We will also be writing about a different event or activity every week in the school's Newsletter.

Why is Children's University important for my child?

Children's University is a charity that works in partnership with schools to develop a love of learning in children. We do this by encouraging and celebrating participation in extra-curricular activities in and outside of school.

The impact of these activities is proven to be positive which is why we're committed to creating a level playing field of opportunity and opening up access to children of all backgrounds.

Research shows that participation in extra-curricular activities can positively impact on attainment, increase a pupil's positive identification with school, and build self-confidence and resilience.
