Early Years



Reception and Nursery worked incredibly hard on their Christmas Nativity performance "Ralph the Reindeer". The teachers are proud of of their confidence and braveness. Well done EYFS!

This week in class, we have been learning all about teamwork — what it is, why it matters, and how we can use it every day.

Teamwork means working together to reach a goal. We discovered that when we share ideas, listen to each other, and help our friends, we can solve problems more quickly and make learning more fun. The children practiced teamwork during group games, building challenges, and even tidy-up time! They noticed that tasks feel easier when everyone joins in.

Miss also reminded us that grown-ups use teamwork too. Even teachers have to work together as a team! Teachers plan lessons together, share ideas, help each other in the classroom, and support one another just like the students do. It was a great reminder that teamwork is a skill we use our whole lives.

We are so proud of how our Year Ones are learning to cooperate, take turns, and cheer each other on. We encourage you to talk at home about times when your family works as a team — like cooking dinner together, cleaning up, or playing a game.

This week in Year 2, the children wrote thankyou letters in role as a character from our core text Katie in London. They then used their purple polishing pens to edit and improve their work, adding descriptive adjectives and "uplevelling" their vocabulary to make their writing even more exciting.

This week, Year 3 have been mastering their 3 and 4 times tables!

Pupils explored a range of strategies to deepen their understanding – from sharing and grouping to using doubling to solve problems. It's been fantastic to see their confidence grow as they discover what works best for them!"



Year Three



Year 4 have been completing their cartouches ready for the final stage of their creations for the Year 4 gallery next week. They used their inscribing and sculpting skills to create hieroglyphs to personalise the centre of their cartouche.



Year Five



In Year 5, we have been writing diary entries from the perspective of Matthew Henson, exploring his experiences as an Arctic explorer. Pupils then used Olex.ai to help them edit and improve their writing, focusing on vocabulary, clarity, and impact. A great combination of historical understanding and thoughtful editing!

In science, we have been learning about the properties of materials. We carried out a range of experiments to investigate whether different materials were permeable, transparent, translucent, or flexible. To test these properties, we stretched the materials to check their flexibility, looked through them to see how much light could pass through, and poured water over them to observe whether they were permeable.

Safeguarding

LIVING ONLINE

The internet is awash with sophisticated algorithms that learn from our online behaviour and try to predict our wants and needs. That's very helpful in some respects, but it can make the online world difficult for children and young people to negotiate. Content can be brought to them at any time – it may not always be appropriate, and children may not have the ability or the support to deal with it.

PUSHY NOTIFICATIONS

Content is also directed at us through notifications from our apps: letting us know we have a new message or social post to read, for example. While that's useful in some circumstances, it conditions us to keep going back online (and is designed to do so) and can be a near-constant demand on your child's attention. As such alerts become more common, are we experiencing an 'attack of the pings'?

BLURRED BOUNDARIES

There are now so many ways we can communicate online in real time (like instant messaging apps) or with a delay (such as on social media) that it's possible to be constantly in conversation. Young people often prefer quickfire exchanges of text – but using fewer words can cause distressing miscommunications through the lack of non-verbal cues like facial expressions or tone of voice.
